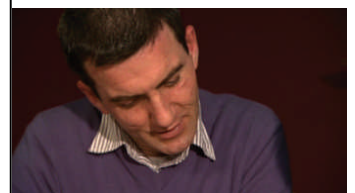

Linda Kirwisa – Limerick Probation Officer



Le Chéilles arrival in Limerick was perfect timing for YPP because it coincided with the Smart (Parent) Support Group to provide support to families and address their isolation and re- integration into the wider community.

I have found those who benefit most from mentoring, although not exclusively, are mostly single parent families with very little involvement or interaction from relations or outside positive role models, and two parent families who have limited involvement and lack of interest in their children’s behaviour, especially from the father, in setting boundaries or enforcing the existing ones. Families living in remote areas with no social and community services also benefit from the intervention of Le Chéile.



Very often when a young person is referred to the Probation Service their parents have feelings of shame, stigma, role overload and emotions of anger and disappointment brought about by their child’s challenging behaviour and perceived failure within their communities. This invariably culminates in a strained relationship between the parent and child and therefore can inadvertently negatively impact on an intervention. Because helping the child involves helping the parent, mentoring becomes one of the crucial services that aims to address this and subsequently reduce the risk of re-offending as it addresses the needs of both the child and the child’s parent. Le Chéile’s informal, fun based and non threatening approach, respect and positive regard creates an environment that is conducive to growth and change.

There has been a high response and positive outcome since the arrival of Le Chéile in Limerick. This is demonstrated by the high attendance and low drop out rates of young offenders. During regular reviews there is evidence of a formed healthy relationship between the mentee and the mentor and the desired wish to continue to engage with the programme.

The careful selection by the Le Chéile co-ordinators of volunteers from a wide and different spectrum that range from professionals to housewives and students, as well as individuals from different trades, allows for the availability of mentors and positive matching of the different clientele that require mentoring services.

While mentors focus on supportive services to the mentees there is a latent support towards the Probation officer’s role and demands as well. The weekly meetings between the mentee and the mentor inadvertently extend the monitoring and supportive services that are required of the Probation officer thereby maximising service provision and inadvertently reducing the risk of re-offending.

Exposure of mentees to the different public and private amenities and settings within the local areas i.e. local hotels, bowling, leisure and other activity centres impact positively on both child and parent when they discover and realise that they too form part of the wider community and they too are entitled to the services therein. As such this reinforces the issue of responsibility and concern toward public resources. It is also worthwhile to take cognisance of the fact that mentoring has a proactive effect on the siblings of those who are already within the criminal justice system.

The relationship and expertise from Siobhan, the Le Chéile co-ordinator; her flexibility and capacity to work as part of a team is commendable and has allowed the smooth operation and implementation of the mentoring programme in Limerick and related catchments areas. *Linda*



Mentoring

A Students Experience with Le Chéile - by: Joanne & Aisling

As part of the Bachelor of Social Work course in UCC, second year students had the opportunity to experience first hand, how social workers interact in different agencies. Through our course we have learned not to see a person in isolation, as it is important to see how structures in society impact on a person's life. The main characteristics of social work are promoting social change and social justice. For our practical experience we expressed an interest in working with young people, and as a result we were fortunate to be placed in Le Chéile.

Initially, we were apprehensive about what the week would entail. However, Fidelma Connolly, the co-ordinator of Le-Chéile Cork ensured we were welcomed by introducing us to the staff in the Westview project. This included probation officers, youth and community workers and mentors, who gave us insight as to how everyone works together for the benefit of young people. The centre is designed especially to meet the needs of young people, as they can be supported and listened to in a relaxed setting.

Our experience at Le Chéile was invaluable, and although Fidelma was extremely busy she involved us in all aspects of her work. It was obvious that mentors are highly valued and respected and viewed as equal partners in the Le Chéile Mentoring Project. It was also evident that Fidelma and mentors alike believe that with extra support, young people can reach their full potential. This is achieved through listening, being non-judgemental and supporting young people while they are on probation.

Overall, our time at Le Chéile proved to be a very positive experience, we have gained practical knowledge that we hope to utilise in the future. This includes building a relationship based on mutual respect and involving young people in all decisions that effect their lives. The experience inspired us to become actively involved with Le Chéile, as we have just completed training and hope to become mentors in the future.

The Strengthening Families Programme

Le Chéile and the South East Regional Drug Task Force ran a joint Information Morning on the Strengthening Families Programme in Waterford in March.

47 professionals from various backgrounds such as Probation, HSE, Vol & Comm Sector & Drug Task Force funded projects attended the morning and received information.

Professionals travelled from Kilkenny, Carlow, Wexford, Tipperary and Waterford to listen and to get a perspective on how best to plan, deliver and evaluate the SFP programme in their area.

Le Chéile is hoping to be involved in running programmes in these areas in the future in conjunction with YPP.

Following the presentations the attendees broke into their county groups to discuss forming a group of interested persons or a committee that would assess the need and plan for a programme in their area. A number of groups already put a date in their diary for March and April 2010 to meet.

Le Chéile are hopeful that a two day Group Leader Training will run in Waterford area in the summer of 2010 in order to train professionals in the programme.

Chris Purnell from the South East Regional Drug Task Force commented that *"in partnership with Le Chéile, we're delighted to facilitate the information event, and would very much hope that one or more of these evidence based, family skills programmes will be established in the South East. It was also gratifying to see the attendance of representatives from so many agencies and sectors involved in the care and support of young people and families, particularly those involved in substance misuse."*

A focus on: Cork (SFP)

Le Chéile funded a Cork Southside programme in Togher that started in October 2010 and completed on the 9th February 2010 and was co-ordinated by Carol Maricle of Le Chéile. This programme was supported by the Cork SFP Steering Committee that meet a number of times a year to plan and promote best practice in SFP in the Cork area.

The Togher programme was facilitated by a wide group of professionals including staff from Health Promotion, Ogra Chorcaí, Le Chéile, Togher Link Up, Garda Síochána, Social Work, UCC students of Social Work.

Vourneen O'Mahony, centre manager of the Togher Family Centre (venue of the programme) congratulated the participants on completion and noted that she would be delighted to welcome the programme back again.

9 families completed the programme in total, with 27 individual family members involved.

The graduation night took place in February 2010 and participants were given a family framed certificate and received a family portrait picture that was taken a three weeks earlier. *Carol*

Cork (Mentoring)

The demand for Mentors continues to increase in the Cork Region and having recently recruited and trained a further 16 volunteers we are confident that we will continue to provide the YPP Team with volunteers who are committed to supporting and effecting change in the lives of Young People.

The new group of volunteers come from all walks of life and range in age from early 20's to mid 50's, they share a common belief in the concept of giving freely of their time to help others and chose Le Chéile as they would specifically like to work with young people involved in the Criminal Justice System.

As part of the on-going training of volunteers the Cork Office was delighted to welcome Garda Michael Collins J.L.O. to present a Training Event on the 18th March, 2010. Michael gave an excellent presentation on the genesis of the Juvenile Diversion Programme starting with a discussion of the 1908 Children Act and the subsequent Legislative Acts influencing the care and rights of children under Irish law. He outlined the changes in relation to how children are treated in the Court system following the Children Act 2001 and explained the process of how Gardai refer children to the Juvenile Diversion Programme. Michael acknowledged community based sanctions as the future of the Irish Youth Justice Service and quoted Michelle Shannon, National Direct of the Irish Youth Justice Service, as follows:

"To create a safer society by working in partnership to reduce youth offending through appropriate interventions and linkages to services"

In February, following a request from UCC, two 2nd year Social Work Students spent 4 days on placement with Cork Office. This follows a pilot project by UCC to place 2nd year BSW students in agencies for a week's practice exposure to help them identify key aspects of learning for themselves as future practitioners.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank the YPP Team and all in Westview Project for the time they gave to the students; particularly Rosemary Fox for explaining the work of the YPP Team and Mary Walsh for giving them the experience of shadowing her on Court Duty to Mallow District Court. *Fidelma*

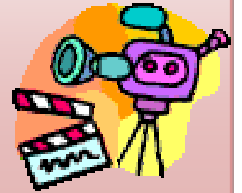
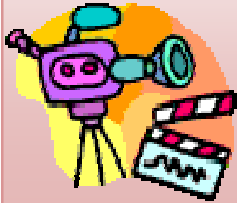
